


CHECK HEP C PATIENT NAVIGATION PROGRAM 2016 FINAL REPORT

Background

- 146,500 people are infected with hepatitis C (Hep C) in New York City.
- Forty percent are unaware of their infection and only 18% have been cured.
- Treating and curing Hep C reduces the risk of liver disease, cancer and premature death, and prevents transmission of the virus.
- People with Hep C face strong barriers to accessing Hep C care and treatment. Barriers include drug use, homelessness, psychiatric conditions and insurance restrictions on medication coverage.
- Patient navigation can help people with Hep C overcome barriers to accessing and completing Hep C care and treatment.

Program OutcomesFrom January 1, 2015 to

From January 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016, Check Hep C served 722 patients living with Hep C. In this time, 358 patients started treatment and 271 completed treatment.



Program Description

The goals of the Check Hep C Patient Navigation Program are to: (1) link people living with Hep C to medical care; (2) support complete Hep C medical evaluation and successful Hep C treatment; (3) prevent reinfection; and (4) help patients maintain liver health after treatment. The program is administered by the New York City Health Department.

In Fiscal Year 2016 (FY2016), New York City Council allocated \$430,502 to fund one to two full-time patient navigators at five sites to provide linkage to care and clinical care coordination services. Services included:

- Hep C health promotion
- Referrals to supportive services
- Linkage to Hep C medical care
- Accompaniment to or reminders for medical appointments
- Alcohol and drug counseling
- Case conferencing with medical care team
- Treatment readiness and adherence support
- Medication access support

NYC Health

Patient Characteristics

56% were Medicaid beneficiaries.

34% were homeless or unstably housed.

32% had a mental health diagnosis.

30% reported injection drug use in the past year.

"My [Check Hep C] patient navigator was my patient navigator but he was a little more than that. He went steps further than that and, by the grace of God, I went through the whole process [of Hep C care and treatment]. I got clean at the same time. I stopped using totally because I had somebody in my life that was [there] for me...He got me through the methadone program, [through] Hep C treatment, [and into] the shelter. I got my life back."


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The following map shows the rate of newly reported Hep C in 2015 by ZIP code and the location of Check Hep C program sites.
