- Testing

Identify and reduce cultural and language barriers to:

- Immunization
- Screening
- Treatment for liver diseases



Provide screening, immunization, referral services for African immigrants



# CHIPO-NYC Objectives

### The objectives of the CHIPO-NYC Liver Health Initiative are:

- Organize hepatitis B and C screening and vaccination events in collaboration with organizations serving African communities
- Distribute hepatitis resources to African communities and table at health fairs
- Promote the Check Hep B Patient Navigation Program as a resource to organizations serving the African community
- Develop local hepatitis B and C awareness and education campaigns and strategies
- Advocate for an FQHC-based "African Immigrant Health Program" that would address viral hepatitis and the unique needs of the African immigrant community
- Explore the development of a "Liver Cancer Prevention Fund" to cover the cost of hepatitis testing and medical evaluation for the uninsured

### HEPATITIS B

Hepatitis B (Hep B) is a virus transmitted through blood contact or sex. Most people get it at birth.

It is possible to get Hep B from having unprotected sex, sharing personal care items (razors or toothbrushes), used needles or ritual circumcision.

#### HEALTHY LIVER

Your liver keeps you alive, it cleans toxins from your blood, and makes energy for your body. With Hep B, the liver can't do its job.

#### SCARRING OF THE LIVER

Hep B is a virus that attacks the liver. Most people don't feel sick, and don't know their liver is getting damaged.

### SEVERE LIVER

Hep B can get worse over time. Symptoms can take 30 years to show, and are often a sign of advanced liver disease.

#### LIVER CANCER

Hep B can lead to liver cancer. The only way of surviving liver cancer is surgery or transplant.



#### GETTESTED

Get tested to know if you have Hep B.
Medications are available to prevent liver
damage even for those with
no insurance at no cost.
Don't wait until it's too late.

You can avoid the painful journey.
Protect yourself and your family by getting
tested and vaccinated.
