

2024 HEPATITIS AWARENESS MONTH EVENT REPORT

"Viral Hepatitis Initiative"







To mark National Hepatitis Awareness Month in May, in addition to National Hispanic Hepatitis Day <u>Hispanic Federation (HF)</u>, the nation's premier Latino nonprofit membership organization, together with New York City's Department of Health, and a diverse coalition of community-based organizations teamed up for a press conference on the steps of City Hall on Thursday morning to call for increased testing, access to care, and treatment of viral hepatitis citywide.

Viral hepatitis attacks the liver and can cause serious health problems. Hepatitis B and C disproportionately affects Latino, Asian, African, and African American communities, as well as the LGBTQ+ community, people who inject drugs, and formerly or currently incarcerated men and women. Specifically, Latinos see higher rates of death from hepatitis C compared with white counterparts. The <u>national rate of hepatitis C-related deaths for Latinos was 4.64</u> per 100,000, higher than the overall national rate of 3.72 per 100,000 hep C deaths as recently as 2018.

MISSION

Since the beginning of May, the HepFreeNYC task force, which consists of community-based organizations and health advocates, have coordinated trainings and social media chats to bring together their network of advocates, doctors, and service providers dedicated to building capacity to prevent, manage, and treat hepatitis B and C in New York City.



On May 22nd, local organizations participated in a Hepatitis Outreach Event in the South Bronx. During the event, free hepatitis C and B screenings were administered, as well as linkage to care. Additionally, overdoses were reversed by providing Narcan.

- 15 Organizations
- 15 Hep B or C tests were Conducted
- 89 Follow up
- 3 Linkage to care
- 2 emergency Narcans were administered to reverse overdose.
